Bologna can alternatively be made out of chicken, turkey, beef, pork, venison or soy protein.

Bologna Bowl - When a slice of bologna is heated, the fat renders and the round slice takes the shape of a bowl which may be filled with cheese or other fillings.

Bud was blessed with three grandchildren; Ashlynn Moutaw, Aryn and husband Tyler Kirby, and Amelia Avery. He is preceded in death by his father Earl Avery, mother Eileen Avery and his uncle/brother and best friend Ronald Powell.

Bud was born January 16th 1939 to Earl and Eileen Avery in Lucien. Bud spent the majority of his youth in Garber and attended Garber schools.

Bud was drafted into the U.S. Army January 18th 1962, and stationed at Fort Hood, Texas.

During this time he married Ona M. Bailey of Covington on December 12th 1962. After an honorable discharge in 1964 Bud and Ona moved back to the Garber area where they remained for over 54 years. Bud worked for Halliburton for 10 years. He then decided to start Roy D. "Bud" Avery Trucking which he continued as owner/operator for over 37 years.

Bud will be remembered as a loving husband, father, grandfather and friend. He was a generous individual who helped others and loved to visit and reminisce of times past and present.

On this day in history

1969 Burton buys Liz a diamond

Movie star Richard Burton dazzles wife Elizabeth Taylor when he buys her a 69-carat Cartier diamond ring costing \$1.5 million.

Taylor and Burton met and fell in the love during the filming of Cleopatra (1963). She was a 30-year-old London-born American starlet who was already on her fourth marriage, and he was a former British stage actor, also married but known to fool around and drink on the set. On March 15, 1964, they were married at the Ritz in Montreal.

The famous Cartier diamond was the product of a fight they had in a restaurant one night. Burton called Taylor's hands large and ugly, and she responded that in that case, he'd better buy her the 69-carat ring she wanted so that her hands looked smaller and more attractive.

The flawless, pear-shaped diamond had 58 facets and was unearthed from the Premier mine of South Africa in 1966. It went up for auction in October 1969 and was bought by the Cartier jewelry firm for \$1.05 million. The very next day, on October 24, Burton bought the diamond for an estimated \$1.5 million; although the exact sum was undisclosed.

The diamond—christened the "Taylor-Burton"—remained at Cartier for several days before Burton took it home and presented it to Taylor. Thousands of people lined the street outside Cartier every day to view it.

Taylor and Burton became estranged in 1970, in 1973 they formally separated, and in 1974 they divorced. They remarried in 1975. The next year, they divorced for the second and last time. Three years later, Taylor put the Taylor-Burton diamond up for auction. The jeweler Henry Lambert bought it for \$3 million.

Glass Fusing will meet in Creative Arts Building 110 from 6:30 p.m. 9 p.m. on the following Thursdays: Oct. 26, Nov. 2, Nov. 9 and Nov. 16.

The class fee is \$25, which does not include the cost of the glass. Students will pay at the first class session.

Ingredients


- 2 cups raw pumpkin seeds
- 1 1/2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 1/2 tablespoons butter, melted
- 1 1/4 teaspoons seasoned salt

Directions

Preheat the oven to 250 degrees F (120 degrees C).

Rinse the pumpkin seeds and pat dry. Place them in a bowl. Add the Worcestershire sauce, melted butter and seasoned salt; stir until evenly coated. Spread out in an even layer on a baking sheet.

Bake for about 1 hour in the preheated oven, stirring occasionally, until crisp, dry and golden brown.

Ask Rusty - Social Security Matters

Railroad retirement benefits vs. Social Security

Dear Rusty: My neighbor was a long time employee of the railroad and has told me that he doesn't receive Social Security like I do, but rather gets Railroad Retirement Benefits which are, according to him, better than Social Security. This irks me a little bit because I've worked my whole life paying those FICA taxes, so why should my neighbor have a better retirement benefit than me? And just what exactly is this Railroad thing he's covered by? Signed: Annoyed

Dear Annoyed: Let there be peace among neighbors! While your neighbor's railroad retirement benefit may be better than your Social Security benefit, he also paid more into it over his lifetime than you contributed to Social Security.

First, a little history.

Back in the 1920's workers in the railroad industry were covered by various private pensions that were beset with problems, leaving those workers vulnerable to inadequate financial sup-

port during their old age.

Following the Great Depression those pension problems reached crisis proportions and in 1934 Congress enacted the Railroad Retirement Act (RRA), which was meant to help aging and needy railroad workers who would not be covered under the planned Social Security system.

Various legal issues held the program up until 1937 when about 50,000 private railroad pensions were transferred into the Federal Railroad Retirement program.

A financial interchange between Social Security and Railroad benefits was set up in 1951, eventually evolving to the Railroad Retirement Act of 1974.

The program has continued to undergo refinements as needed, and is administered by an independent Federal agency called the Railroad Retirement Board (RRB).

Railroad employees pay taxes into the system for two separate benefit categories known as Tier I and Tier II. Tier I contributions are similar to Social Security (6.20%), but Tier II contributions - essentially for a supplemental pension - are an additional 3.9%. In both cases, there is a maximum taxable wage cap. And similar to Social Security, another 1.45% is levied for Medicare.

Without getting into the myriad of details, suffice to say that just like Social Security, RRA has eligibility criteria for beneficiaries. Although Tier I railroad benefits are intended to somewhat mimic Social Security, there are a lot of nuances in the railroad retirement program, which can make benefits higher.

So how different are the benefits? Well, for 2016 the average Social Security retirement benefit was about \$1,350 per month, while the average retirement benefit for railroad employees was about \$2,675 per month. While the difference is substantial, remember that a defined benefit pension is part of rail employees' retirement benefits. Further, career rail employees - those who have contributed through payroll taxes for a long period of time - receive considerably more than the average.

So if your neighbor was a long time railroad employee, don't begrudge him his somewhat higher benefit. He earned it, just as you have earned Social Security plus any additional pension benefit you might enjoy from working in the private sector.

Session budget agreement reached

Oklahoma City - Governor Mary Fallin, Senate President Pro Tempore Mike Schulz and House Speaker Charles McCall today reached an agreement adjusting the 2018 fiscal year budget that, among other things, helps fill the \$215 million budget hole and puts Oklahoma on a more stable budget path, as well as provides a needed teacher pay raise.

If passed by the Legislature, the agreement would:

- Place a \$1.50 tax on a package of cigarettes.
- Provide for a 6-cent fuel tax increase.
- Revise taxes on alcoholic beverages.
- Restore the Earned Income Tax credit.
- Provide for a \$3,000 teacher pay increase, effective Aug. 1, 2018.

Provide for a \$1,000 increase for state employees, effective Aug. 1, 2018. It does not pertain to higher education, legislators or constitutional officers, such as statewide elected officials and judges.

"This agreement is the result of countless hours of discussions and meetings," said Fallin. "I appreciate President Pro Tem Schulz and Speaker McCall working to provide a long-term solution to our state's continuing budget shortfalls. It is apparent that rapid changes in our economy have created unsustainable and unpredictable revenue collection patterns. We need to seek long-term sustainability and stability as opposed to unpredictability and volatility. This agreement makes more recurring revenue available, helps us stop balancing our budget with one-time funds, and provides a teacher pay raise as well as a raise for our hard-working state employees, who have not had an across-the-board pay increase in eleven years. And, most importantly, it provides sufficient revenues to meet the basic responsibilities of state government, such as education, health and public safety. We must deliver services that work for the people, and put people over politics."

Schulz said: The Legislature has a tremendous opportunity with this deal to solve our immediate budget crisis, put the state on more solid financial ground moving forward, and deliver on a much-needed and much-deserved pay raise for classroom teachers and most state employees. Girl's first elk hunt yields new Cy Curtis state record

Thanks to a little kindness and understanding from a softball coach, Oklahoma now has a new record typical elk in its Cy Curtis Awards Program. And the record-holder is just 15 years old.

Olivia Parry of Camargo was just 14 and on her first elk hunt when she bagged the bull elk on private land in Dewey County on Oct. 16, 2016. After the mandatory drying period, the 5-by-5 rack was scored at 377 6/8, shattering the existing Cy Curtis record by 39 2/8.



to attend softball practice in Laverne with her team. But the elk hunt was still on her mind.

"I asked the coach if I could leave a little early," Olivia said. The coach agreed, and Olivia arrived back in the field about 5 p.m. And it wasn't long before the big bull ambled into the open, and the Vici High School freshman lifted her .270-caliber rifle and squeezed the trigger.

"I started crying because I thought I'd missed him," she recalled. But her shot

hadn't missed. As they looked over the trophy, Parry told his daughter it could well be a state (Cy Curtis) record. But Olivia said she could not comprehend what that meant at the time.

Later, when they delivered the bull elk to be processed, the processor remarked how big the rack was, and that it might be a new record. That's when the magnitude struck her.

"It was then I was thinking, 'This could really be it.' I was so excited. I thought that was crazy that I could have the state record!"

The score qualifies Olivia's elk as a Boone and Crockett Club All-Time Record and will forever be listed in Records of North American Big Game produced by that organization.

Even though she is a seasoned veteran of deer hunting - she bagged her first doe at age 11 - Olivia has now decided she enjoys elk hunting most of all. Still, she is fond of deer, turkey and dove hunting, too.

As for her Oklahoma Cy Curtis record elk, the mount is hanging in the barn. "He won't fit in the house," Olivia said. But that's OK for now, she said, "as long as he stays clean."

Olivia and her father, Scott Parry, who is the Northwest Region Wildlife Supervisor for the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation, began the hunt the previous evening. Olivia said that is when she first saw the big elk that would become the focus of the hunt, but shooting hours closed soon after.

The next morning, father and daughter were in the field again, and it was a dusky morning, Olivia recalled. As the morning brightened, she began using binoculars to scan her surroundings.

"And we were just sitting there waiting around, and he popped out on our hillside." Nothing to do but wait, she thought.

"I thought he was a really nice elk," she said. But the animal was at least 300 yards away, too far to get a good shot. "I wanted to shoot, but I didn't want to mess it up, scare him off."

By this time, the morning had slipped into afternoon, without any chance to take a shot. So Olivia and her dad decided to take a break, allowing Olivia



Cowgirls sweep ITA Regionals

LAWRENCE, Kan. - The Oklahoma State women's tennis team completed a perfect day of competition Thursday at the ITA Central Region Championships, with all four Cowgirls and both OSU doubles teams advancing.

"It was a good start to the weekend," head coach Chris Young said. "The girls were focused today and we were able to work on some things that will help us as the weekend moves on."

The day started in doubles, with both Cowgirl doubles teams advancing to the round of 32 with convincing victories. The Pokes' dominance continued in singles play, with the Cowgirls not surrendering a single set in the round of 128. In fact, in four combined singles matches, OSU only gave up seven total games.

The second-seeded tandem of Vladica Babic and Sofia Blanco picked up their third win of the season, dropping Anita Detlava and Beerta Masdevall Masip, 8-3 to advance. The Cowgirl duo will match up with Tulsa's Shura Poppe and Tamara Kupkova in Friday's round of 32.

Ninth-seeded Katarina Stresnakova and Marina Guinart will also be competing in the round of 32 Friday after handling South Dakota's Anastasiia Bondarenko and Aria Chemodanova, 8-2. Stresnakova and Guinart will take on Tina Kreinis and Caitlyn Merzbacher for a spot in the round of 16 on Friday.

Blanco was the first Cowgirl to advance in singles, knocking off Arkansas State's Sabina Jeresic, 6-1, 6-3. Seeded fifth overall, Blanco will play Oklahoma's Camila Romero in the round of 64 on Friday.

Stresnakova will take on Ellie Wright of Minnesota in the round of 64 on Friday after a dominant, 6-0, 6-1 win over Southeastern Missouri's Isabella Krupa in her first round match.

Similarly, 12th-seeded Guinart tallied a 6-0, 6-1 win over Gisela Kemper of Northern Iowa to set up a round of 64 match with Minnesota's Clare Raley on Friday. Guinart has gone 3-1 as a Cowgirl, with her three wins leading the team in singles.

Babic clinched the first-day sweep for the Pokes, handing Arkansas State's Anita Detlava a 6-0, 6-1 loss to advance. The second-seeded senior will face either Vasanti Shinde of Nebraska or Joely Lomas of Drake in the round of 64.

Cowboy baseball hosts Northeastern State

STILLWATER - Oklahoma State hosted a game against Northeastern State Friday at Allie P. Reynolds Stadium as the Cowboys continue preparations for the 2018 season.

OSU is coming off a 2017 season in which it made its fifth-straight NCAA Tournament appearance under head coach Josh Holliday. The Cowboys finished with a 30-27 record and claimed a Big 12 Conference championship when they won the league's postseason tournament, a title that marked the program's 32nd conference crown.



The Cowboys added 20 newcomers to their roster in the offseason after losing six position players, including their top two hitters and five players who started at least 23 games a year ago. OSU must also replace nine pitchers who combined for 235 2/3 innings, 14 wins and eight saves in 2017.

Northeastern State is coming off a season in which the RiverHawks went 22-25. The Cowboys and NSU have squared off on the diamond four times previously, the last coming during the 2012 season with OSU claiming a 6-4 win in Stillwater.



Special session budget agreement reached

OKLAHOMA CITY – Governor Mary Fallin, Senate President Pro Tempore Mike Schulz and House Speaker Charles McCall today reached an agreement adjusting the 2018 fiscal

year budget that, among other things, helps fill the \$215 million budget hole and puts Oklahoma on a more stable budget path, as well as provides a needed teacher pay raise. If passed by the Legislature, the agreement would:

- Place a \$1.50 tax on a package of cigarettes.
- Provide for a 6-cent fuel tax increase.
- Revise taxes on alcoholic beverages.
- Restore the Earned Income Tax credit.
- Provide for a \$3,000 teacher pay increase, effective Aug. 1, 2018.
- Provide for a \$1,000 increase for state employees, effective Aug. 1, 2018. It does not pertain to higher education, legislators or constitutional officers, such as state-wide elected officials and judges.

“This agreement is the result of countless hours of discussions and meet-

ings,” said Fallin. “I appreciate President Pro Tem Schulz and Speaker McCall working to provide a long-term solution to our state’s continuing budget shortfalls. It is apparent that rapid changes in our economy have created unsustainable and unpredictable revenue collection patterns. “We need to seek long-term sustainability and stability as opposed to unpredictability and volatility.”

“This agreement makes more recurring revenue available, helps us stop balancing our budget with one-time funds, and provides a teacher pay raise as well as a raise for our hard-working state employees, who have not had an across-the-board pay increase in eleven years. “And, most importantly, it provides sufficient revenues to meet the basic responsibilities of state

government, such as education, health and public safety. We must deliver services that work for the people, and put people over politics.”

Schulz said, “The Legislature has a tremendous opportunity with this deal to solve our immediate budget crisis, put the state on more solid financial ground moving forward, and deliver on a much-needed and much-deserved pay raise for classroom teachers and most state employees....”

McCall said: “We believe this plan gives us the best opportunity to pass the House and Senate, and provides the state with needed revenue to stabilize mental health and substance abuse programs, keep rural hospitals open, and provide a pay raise that would make Oklahoma teachers the highest paid in the region for starting pay.”

Enchilacomalejita casserole (Mexican casserole)

(ENCHILada-tACO-taMALE-faJITA) I didn't have all the ingredients to make any one whole recipe, so I decided to improvise. Necessity is the mother of invention! We weren't disappointed!

Cook time: 15 Min

Prep time: 30 Min

Serves: 8-10

Ingredients

- 2 lb ground beef
 - 1 medium onion, chopped
 - 1 green bell pepper, chopped
 - 2 pkg taco mix, low sodium
 - 1 1/2 c water
 - 3 large flour tortillas
 - 1 bag(s) corn tortilla chips, preferably low or no salt
 - 4-6 c mexican blend cheese, grated
 - 2 c velveeta shreds, optional
 - 2 c enchilada sauce, recipe below or use bottled
 - chopped lettuce
 - chopped tomatoes
 - sour cream
- ENCHILADA SAUCE**
- 2 Tbsp vegetable or canola oil
 - 2 Tbsp flour
 - 4 Tbsp chili powder

1/2 tsp garlic powder

1/2 tsp salt

1/4 tsp cumin

1/4 tsp oregano

2 c chicken broth

Directions

1. Brown ground beef with bell pepper and onion. Drain. Mix in taco mix and water; simmer while you make the enchilada sauce or for about 10 minutes.

2. In a 9x13 baking dish, spread about 1/2 c enchilada sauce on bottom. Cut the flour tortillas to fit the pan to make 1 layer. Crumble a couple of handfuls of the crispy corn tortilla chips over the flour tortillas.

Sprinkle about half the meat mixture over the chips. Drizzle with enchilada sauce, saving some for the next layer. Sprinkle with cheese. Repeat another layer, finishing with cheese.

3. Bake at 375° for 15 minutes or until cheese is melted and bubbly.

4. Serve with chopped tomatoes, shredded lettuce, sour cream, salsa, etc. Optional add-in: Cooked pinto beans: Mix into meat mixture before layering. Retried beans: Just add another layer while you are layering.

5. Enchilada Sauce: Heat oil in a small saucepan over medium-high heat. Add flour and stir together over the heat for one minute. Stir in the remaining



seasonings (chili powder through oregano). Then gradually add in the chicken broth, whisking constantly to remove

Enchilacomalejita Casserole (Mexican Casserole) lumps. Reduce heat and simmer 10-15 minutes until thick. Use immediately or refrigerate in an air-tight container for up to two weeks.



Meridian Tech innovation receives national award

STILLWATER – Innovation is central to Meridian Tech's mission.

In fact, it's one of Meridian's core values. With a focus on integrating new ideas with courage, it's no surprise that Dustin Hicks, Practical Nursing Instructor/Simulation Specialist at Meridian Technology Center, was recently honored for helping drive innovation in the organization.

Students in Meridian's Practical Nursing program are the beneficiaries. Hicks developed a procedure that students can train on with one of the school's SimMan 3G medical manikins.

Now they are able to use a chest tube to measure chest drainage output and practice basic chest tube management techniques, something they will encounter when they enter their future profession.

The National League for Nursing Simulation Innovation Resource Center (NLN SIRC) recognized Hicks' innovation through its HomeGrown Simulation Solutions contest.

The HomeGrown Simulation Solutions program honors the self-made, creative adaptations and original simulation scenarios that educators using simulation manikins have developed.

The new procedure uses a chest drainage collection system, a Jackson-Pratt drain that is used to collect bodily fluids from surgical sites, tubing, SimMan3G Wound Kids, nasal cannula tubing and one pair of hemostat clamps.

"The SimMan3G is a great tool for learning, but its design lends itself more easily to emergency medical care than day-to-day nursing care," Hicks explained. "The modification that I made provides a simple way for nursing students to practice, and, ultimately master, a common procedure they will encounter with patients."

Hicks has led the school's simulation efforts since 2009. Meridian's simulation facilities include a four-room mock hospital equipped with three Laerdal SimMan 3G manikins, SimJunior, SimBaby and a PROMPT Birthing Simulator.

The life-like manikins are primarily used in the school's health training programs, but they are also available for customized business and industry classes with medical professionals and first responders.

Innovation Across Campus

Innovation is not limited to one program at Meridian – it's taking

place all across the campus.

As an example, students in the Biomedical Sciences STEM Academy brought new dimension to a recent anatomy and physiology lesson. Using the Tinkercad computer aided design program and a 3D printer, they created 3D models of various muscle and cell structures they had been studying.

This innovative application of technology allowed students to gain a better understanding of what the cells look like in the body, according to Morrison student Noah Spence.

"It's one thing to see the cell structure on the page and learn about its properties," he said. "It's entirely different to hold a model of it, see how each part forms and recognize

how different each type of cell is."

Additionally, innovation can be seen in the form of peer mentoring programs that pair second-year students with first-year students for the school year. These programs allow returning students to demonstrate their technical skills and grow their leadership skills. In the Welding and Masonry programs second-year students also rotate as classroom job site superintendents.

With the assistance of the instructor, they help ensure lab safety, spot-checking work for quality and help manage project timelines.

"We try to replicate what it's really going to be like for them when they leave the classroom and enter the workforce," Welding Instructor Joe Steele explained. "When they leave the program, I want to be sure they are career ready. This means they have the welding skills they need for the industry, and the soft skills they need to work as a part of a team and be a good employee."
